"TOWARDS JERUSALEM" Luke 9:51-56; 19:28-44

Passage Overview:

Jesus "set his face" to go to Jerusalem. He knew how this journey would culminate as He would lay His life down for sinners. Yet nothing would deter Him. It was for this purpose He had come into the world.

Going to Jerusalem for the Passover Feast was normally a time of great celebration. Families prepared for this trip with great anticipation. In addition to the usual excitement, the disciples expected Jesus to enter Jerusalem and set up His kingdom. They anticipated that He would be acclaimed by the masses and they would become men of influence, holding significant positions at His side. Their misplaced hopes would soon be revealed.

As they began their journey south, Jesus sought lodging in a Samaritan village and was rebuffed. These Samaritans rejected Jerusalem as the central place of worship, so were not about to host a group of Jews who were headed there. James and John responded with predictable anger, but Jesus responded with grace. He simply moved on, and another village was blessed by the presence of the King.

Many days later, Jesus entered Jerusalem to the applause and acclaim of the masses, yet He wept, knowing their unreceptive hearts. The Prince of Peace had arrived in their midst, but they didn't recognize Him. They were looking for a political liberator instead. Their rejection of peace would eventuate in their being besieged and overwhelmed by violence.
