"DEAD AND BURIED" Luke 23:26-56

Passage Overview:

All of human history turns around the crucifixion of Jesus. The Old Testament saints were looking forward to God's provision of salvation. A new covenant had been promised. A perfect sacrifice was needed. Their faith was a manifestation of their trust and dependence upon God to provide redemption. And every believer since the crucifixion of Jesus places their hope and trust in His perfect sacrifice for their sins alone. Whether looking forward or looking backward, it is Jesus' death upon the cross and His subsequent resurrection from the dead that is the focus of every person's destiny.

This "old" story is ever new. Every individual must respond. What will you do with Jesus? Will you trust Him? Do you believe He died for you? And if you do, are you telling others that He died for them?

As you read Luke's account of the crucifixion this week, pay special attention to how the individuals around Jesus responded. Some scoffed. Others mocked. Others were in grief or even praise. But at least one individual at the cross recognized that Jesus was not only innocent, but that He was inaugurating His kingdom.

How do you respond to Jesus on the cross? Is it a worn out story? Is it too familiar? Has His sacrifice for you radically changed not only your past and future, but also your present?

Without Jesus' death and resurrection, there can be no salvation.
