"CONTENTED RELIANCE" Philippians 4:2-23

## **Passage Overview:**

As Paul concludes his letter to the Philippian believers, he addresses what it means to live contented lives in Jesus. Contentedness is grounded in reliance, but independence and self-focused living prevent contentedness from taking root.

The Spirit exhorts the Philippians, and us, to Christ-reliance at every level of our existence: heart, mind, and actions. Joy presides when we rely on the Lord instead of anxiously trying to work things out on our own. Our minds too must be fixed on thoughts that correspond to His mind. As we lift our minds out of the base realms in which human thinking so often dwells, we learn the grace of His excellencies, resulting in the experience of His peace. Finally, Paul urges the Philippians to imitate him as He imitates Christ.

Paul then returns to sharing his thankfulness for the partnership of the Philippian church with him, just as he had at the beginning of his letter. As he thanks them for the gift that they sent him through Epaphroditus, he takes the opportunity to share with them the peace he has found through being content in any circumstance. He has learned to rejoice and enjoy abundance, but also how to be joy filled and content in times of great need. His contentment is not located in circumstances or possession, but in his deep reliance upon and joy in Jesus.

As you read this week, ask yourself how you would rate your level of contentment. What determines how contented you are? Is knowing Jesus and walking intimately with Him enough to fill you with joy and peace?
