

HPBC creates online community to better connect

Beginning this summer, HPBC church members will be asked to join our new online community, called *MyHPBC*. This community will provide an online place where members of the church can share information within the church body.

Church leaders in charge of the this project are Pastor Dave Borror, I.T. Director Andy Veldman and Business Manager Dave Kuntzman. They recently answered several questions posed by The Connection.

What is the MyHPBC Online Community?

MyHPBC is our new church management software system that will function, in its simplest form, much like a membership directory, but with a host of additional useful resources for members, groups, ministry teams, and church leadership. Being online and available to all in the *MyHPBC* Community, this will provide a

quick and simple way to keep individual and family information updated. Information like phone numbers, email addresses, ministry interests and involvements, along with current contact information. Privacy controls will be put in place by each individual member to control what information is willing to be shared.

What features will the MyHPBC Online Community have?

Depending on an individual's privacy settings, members of the online community will be able to access other member's name, address, phone number, email address, and profile picture. This software with family and contact information will also serve as the data hub of our current kid check-in process. Group management,

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"Take a Seat" campaign to help building project end debt-free

Throughout the summer months the HPBC family will hear about and be encouraged to take part in the *Take a Seat* Campaign, a short-term fundraiser designed to ensure the Worship Center renovations end in the black.

The anticipated new brown chairs with light wood armrests will be on display in the foyer area. Donors will be able to contribute financially to fund the cost of one or two or more seats at \$250 each. The campaign hopes to raise enough to pay for 1,000 seats.

"The *Take a Seat* campaign is going to give everyone in the church an opportunity to contribute towards the seating in the Worship Center," said Dave Kuntzman, business manager. "Each seat costs about \$250, so our goal is to raise the \$250,000 needed to be sure we can finish the project without any debt."

Construction crews started renovating HPBC's Worship Center in April as the final phase of the Next Chapter, a threeyear church building renovation designed to upgrade our 50-plus year old facility for ministry. The Worship Center is the most expensive phase of the Next Chapter projects. As of May 31, the church had \$2,917,000 on hand to complete the Worship Center renovation, and projections show there could be a shortfall of up to \$250,000 by the time it is completed. This shortfall is directly attributed to the inability of some to fulfill their Next Chapter financial pledges. Because church leaders are committed that the Next Chapter projects be done on a cash-only basis, leaders hope the Take a Seat campaign will provide a fun and tangible way for the HPBC family to fill in the remaining funds that are needed to complete the Worship Center remodel.

a Bible reading challenge, a Bible study, Munchy Mondays, Wednesday night services, mission trips and more.

Kenneth Gabbert and Jeremy Einem, directors of the Herd and Crash respectively, said they are excited for summer because it provides the opportunity to spend more time with students. During the school year homework and after school activities keep students extremely scheduled, but in summer everything stops.

"As great as it is to have our (SCS) students in the same building with us during the school year, the summer is actually a better time for us to be relational with them because they have so much more free time," said Jeremy. (About 80 percent of the roughly 150 To make the most of this summer, all Herd and Crash students will be encouraged to participate in a 70-day Bible reading challenge. The verses are mostly from the book of Acts and focus on the Great Commission with specific verses assigned for each day.

Also new is a five week at home Bible study. The Bible studies will start in July and sign up is not necessary. Pastor Brent Slater: Celebrating Our Changeless God

Summer is here. The flowers fill our gardens with color and the trees have cast off their winter drab for the splendor of endless shades of green. Michigan's season blesses us with change. We love change, don't we? We love it in our chil-



dren. We applaud each developmental change they achieve and send off videos to grandparents to share each new skill and accomplishment. We want them to grow and change.

Change is everywhere. Cars change with each model year. Clothing styles change almost too fast. Opinions change. Politicians promise change. We like change. It offers something new, a sense of hope, the anticipation of improvement.

Yet, the Almighty God never changes. Why is His changelessness something to celebrate? Doesn't a lack of change imply stagnancy, inevitability, or predictability?

Our God cannot and should not change, because He is perfect. He is perfect in essence, in who He is, and in practice, in what He does. Because He is perfect, any change would be a move away from perfection. He is not stagnant. Instead, He is perfectly creative. No development is needed. 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assigned in the 70-day challenge. The middle school Bible study starts July 10 and runs for five straight weeks through Aug. 7.

High schoolers are reading the same passages, but will meet on Monday nights, starting July 11. Locations were still being worked out at the time of this publication.

On Wednesday nights when students meet at church, sermons will center on these daily verses. In the summer the Herd and Crash services are roughly every other week from 6:30-8:30pm – thirty minutes longer than during the school year.

Also new in the Herd is something called "Herd Munchy Mondays" on selected Mondays from 11am-3pm at the church. On these days students show up at 11am with \$10 and a release form. Kenneth and staff will take them out to lunch, and then they will come back to hang out. Jeremy will also be regularly connecting with high schoolers throughout the summer in various ways – though not on a specific day and time.

Also both ministries are planning to go to Central Detroit Christian for their annual summer missions trips. Middle schoolers will go June 26-29 and will do various work projects. High schoolers will go July 17-23 and will run a day camp for kids and do several work projects. The work projects are also expected to be transformational.

It will give us an enhanced opportunity to connect with each other - personally and in groups – all with accurate and up to date contact information. Members of the online community will be able to indicate interest in a group or ministry, and be able to explore opportunities to get involved in the life of HPBC.

How would a person or family join?

Each member of the Online Community will be asked to login, set up a password, and provide update individual, family and church involvement information, and establish privacy set-

New app makes sermons, more just a click away



Miss a Sunday and need a way to easily access Senior Pastor Brent Slater's sermon? Or are you trying to remember the details on an upcoming church event? All of this, and

more, is now just a click away through the new HPBC Southfield app.

The church app is now available at the app store, for iPhone users, or Google Play for android users. Just go to the appropriate site, search HPBC Southfield, and download it for free.

The app offers instant access to sermons, the church calendar, e-giving, the Bible, HPBC's social media sites on Twitter, Facebook and Instagram, plus more.

"Now you do not have to go home to a computer to connect to us. If you are looking to use those resources they are in one central spot in your pocket," said Pat Nagle, director of creative arts.

Recently the church started offering Pushpay as an option for giving. Pushpay is a New Zealand based company that recently started marketing its e-giving product to larger North American churches. The app is free and it allows users to give tithes through e-giving. Users can also use the app to pay bills and make other financial transactions outside of church.

Besides offering e-giving to churches, Pushpay created a custom made app for our church. Pat said, "taking advantage of the company's custom app just made sense."

"We want to make sure we are using every tool at our disposal to reach our church body and our congregation," said Pat. "With the times, and the generations coming up, these are normal parts of life. Smart phones and apps and technology there is just a large percentage of the population using them and we want to remain in touch as well."

Go:Detroit project seeks summer volunteers

HPBC volunteers filled four full -sized commercial dumpsters with debris from Central Detroit Christian's new 30,000 square foot building this spring as the church-wide missions project called Go:Detroit officially got underway.

More HPBC volunteers are expected to head to CDC throughout the summer, doing everything from restoring a gym floor to painting walls to getting the former church building ready for ministry.

"So far we've cleaned the parking lot, took fences down, removed debris from the

building, cleaned up graffiti, and completed a whole host of other small projects, said Dave Kuntzman, HPBC's business and missions director. "The goal is to get a preschool up and running this fall."

CDC is a Christian non-profit ministry that HPBC helps support through its mission's budget. The ministry, located just north of Detroit's New Center area, works to restore lives in one of Detroit's poorest zip codes by providing educational pro-



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life experiences is extremely encouraging, she said.

John Scott, 23, and Kevin White, 23, said they recently started attending class. Both men said the group does a good job of teaching the Bible, and John described the atmosphere as having "a really good vibe."

As Chris, 25, looked about the room on a recent Sunday, he said that the future leadership of the country was represented in this group. This is the deneration that is up and coming, and it is crucial that the church be purposeful in reaching them. It is a generation that can do great things for Christ, he said. HPBC's Board of Elders is encouraging everyone at HPBC to help with the summer mission project, volunteering for a day or more. The goal is to bring our church family together in a service project as HPBC also undergoes construction itself during the Next Chapter renovations.

"As we are engaged in the Next Chapter project at our own facility, we felt it would be of value and importance for us to not just be inward focused but to look beyond our walls," said Dave. "When the CDC opportunity presented itself, everyone thought it was a good opportunity."

HPBC pastors and staff spent two full days working on site in April and three teams of HPBC volunteers were on site for three days in May.

"Thanks to all the volunteers who worked so hard in early June to get the site cleaned up for the next phase of reconstruction," said John Christie, HPBC's volunteer Go:Detroit project manager. "Currently the outside work is essentially complete – at least for now."

After finishing all the outside cleanup, CDC brought in professional contractors to remove asbestos and lead. The contractors finished their work in late May, and the next round of HPBC volunteers were to be back June 11, then continuing to rotate throughout the summer.

"We will keep sending teams as long as CDC has a need," said Dave. "There is more than enough work for people to do."

Volunteer sign up is underway now. Volunteers are required to attend an orientation before showing up on their workday.

"It is exciting to see the actual work starting to happen after several years of planning," said Dave. "Many in our church family have expressed their excitement as things are beginning to happen. It is fun to watch."

All of the demolition work is completed. When the project is done the Worship Center will have updated lighting, electrical, heating and cooling. The platform, where the choirs, band and orchestra are will be larger and more easily changeable between services, among many other modernization benefits.

"They are working primarily now on the new platform and backstage area. They busted through what was the old staff kitchen and a couple off-stage offices," said Dave. "That area is all getting opened up to provide more back-stage area. Incredible amounts of electrical conduit have been run and the work continues. The electrical contractor is here all the time as a big portion of the work is electrical."

During the construction Sunday worship services are held in the high school gym. Volunteers teams set up and tear down each week. About 630 chairs are set up for each Sunday, and an adjacent overflow room provides seating for 100. Attendance is actually running about 8-10 percent higher than last year at this time, said Dave. Construction work is scheduled to be completed Nov. 13. The first service in the new facility is anticipated to be Nov. 20, just in time for Thanksgiving.
